

What is BOCES?

BOCES stands for Board of Cooperative Educational Services. BOCES are public organizations that were created by the New York State Legislature in 1948 to provide shared educational programs and services to school districts.

How do the BOCES programs work?

BOCES services are created when two or more school districts determine they have similar needs that can be met by a shared program. BOCES helps school districts save money by providing opportunities to pool resources and share costs. Sharing is an economical way for districts to provide programs and services that they might not be able to afford otherwise. It is usually more efficient and less costly to operate one central service than it is to have separate programs in each school district. However, BOCES services are often customized, offering districts the flexibility to meet their individual needs.

How is BOCES governed?

Each BOCES is governed by a board of trustees that is made up of representatives from component school districts. They are elected by component boards of education but serve atlarge for the county. BOCES board members are responsible for policy decisions.

I know BOCES provides special and alternative education programs and career/technical programs, but does BOCES offer other services?

BOCES provides many different types of programs, although Special Education and Career and Technical Education are usually the largest programs. Other services available through BOCES fall into the categories of Technology, Professional Development, Adult Education, Communications and Business Services. The numbers and types of services offered change continuously as component districts' needs and requests evolve.

Who decides which BOCES services to purchase?

Local boards of education review their district's needs each year and make decisions about BOCES services. Because districts' needs change every year, decisions about BOCES services may also change every year. The decision about whether to participate in each BOCES service is based on the unique needs of each district. If a district doesn't need a BOCES service, it doesn't request it and does not pay for it.

Why do school districts participate in BOCES services?

Because BOCES services are shared by two or more school districts, they generally cost much less than if districts provided the services on their own. Districts pool their resources and share the savings.

How are BOCES services paid for?

BOCES have no taxing authority. An administrative charge is assessed in proportion to each component district's size, but most BOCES revenue is from the fees charged to component districts for the BOCES services they have chosen to use. BOCES expenses are incorporated into each district's annual budget. State aid helps to offset some of the cost, and other services are directly funded by the state or federal government.

What is BOCES aid, who gets it, and why?

New York State gives a financial incentive to encourage participation in shared services by offering BOCES state aid for BOCES services. This is how BOCES state aid works: Each district's board of education selects BOCES services for the current year. In the following school year, a portion of the cost of BOCES services is returned to the district by the State of New York. The amount returned to each district depends on which services the district buys and is based on a formula that takes into account the district's financial resources. Money returned to the district is used as revenue.

What BOCES services do not generate BOCES aid for local districts?

Special education services from BOCES do not earn BOCES aid for local districts, but local districts do receive Excess Cost Aid to offset some of the costs of special education. Also, some expenses within services may not be aided. Other services that do not qualify for BOCES aid are student transportation, services funded from other sources, consumables and adult education. The amount of aid varies from district to district.

Do BOCES students graduate from high school?

BOCES does not confer high school diplomas. Most career and technical students and some special education students graduate from their local districts with Regents diplomas.

Provided

Adult Learning Institute (ALI)

The Adult Education Programs at ALI provide services to adults and out-of-school youth in classes from various locations throughout Dutchess County. Programming encompasses six major areas:

- Career and Technical Education
- Academic/GED®/ESL classes
- Programs for targeted populations
- Customized training for business and industry
- Community education
- Online classes

Alternative Education

Dutchess BOCES offers several Alternative Education Programs for young people recognized as being "at risk". These programs provide students with an individualized instructional program with extensive support services leading to a high school diploma.

Business Services

Dutchess BOCES offers a series of cooperative management programs. These programs are designed to provide cost savings, improve service delivery and increase efficiency through shared services among the component districts.

Career and Technical Institute (CTI)

The High School Programs consist of an extensive list of courses that enable students to develop skills and attitudes that lead to career success while fulfilling their high school diploma requirements.

Communications and Grants Research

The mission of the Office of Communications and Grants Research (CGR) is to promote public awareness of programs and services offered by Dutchess BOCES and its component school districts and to explore funding opportunities. This office is primarily responsible for the overall development and implementation of our organization's internal and external communications and for providing school districts with a variety of services to enhance their communication and public relations efforts.

District Superintendent Services

In addition to serving as the Chief Executive Officer of Dutchess BOCES, the District Superintendent serves as the Commissioner's representative to the component districts, as well as the liaison between local districts and the State Education Department.

Educational Resources

The Educational Resources Division provides a broad array of professional support to school districts, schools, their staff and students. The division goal is to improve teaching and learning for all students. This goal is met through services that focus on leadership development, staff training and curriculum development, student literacy, comprehensive planning, data analysis, integration of special and general education, specialized student programming, broadband network infrastructure for video and data, and learning technology.

Facilities and Operations

The Facilities and Operations Division offers an assortment of cooperative programs designed to assist districts with providing a safe and healthy environment, building maintenance and transportation. These programs provide districts with cost effective professional expertise.

Human Resources

The Human Resources Division facilitates the recruitment activities of component districts for both certified and non-certified staff, provides assistance to school districts in complying with certification regulations for coaches, enables participating districts to receive eligible medicaid reimbursement dollars, and acts as a regional certification office for residents and school districts of Dutchess County.

Special Education

Dutchess BOCES Special Education Programs respond to the needs of students and component districts by providing academic and vocational programs, promoting positive attitudes and behaviors and assuring opportunities for individual student growth. A continuum of services, from the consultant teacher model to self-contained classrooms, is available for students from age five through transitional services to the adult world of work.

This Annual Report presents an important opportunity to celebrate the many successes enjoyed by Dutchess BOCES. Our hardworking staff never take success for granted. We are committed to continually improving all of our programs and services to assure that we meet the highest quality standards.

Anti-Bullying Workshop

Dutchess BOCES hosted a three-hour anti-bullying workshop entitled Addressing the Problem of Bullying, presented by two certified individuals from SAANYS, Nancy Andress and James Dillon. Over 100 individuals from various component districts in Dutchess County as well as our Dutchess BOCES staff attended this conference. Schools and society as a whole are working to respond to this issue to staunch this activity and minimize the effects of bullying.

BOCES Environment-Friendly Program

Dutchess BOCES generated a bid for old computer equipment and subsequently received \$10K for the equipment that was otherwise slated for recycling. Finding alternatives to filling our landfills with old equipment is just one way we can maintain a environmentally friendly program while at the same time bring in revenues for our organization. We would like to especially thank Mari Huber for her contributions in making sure that this transaction was successfully completed.


Dutchess BOCES Receives UW Award

Dutchess BOCES Announces its New Adult Learning Institute (ALI): Same Outstanding Adult Education Programs at a New and Convenient Location

On May 2, 2011, the Dutchess BOCES adult education program took on a new name--Dutchess BOCES Adult Learning Institute. ALI (pronounced ally), with its new location at One Civic Center Plaza, Suite 300, in downtown Poughkeepsie, makes it more convenient to pursue your adult education needs. The new location is centrally located (right across the street from the Mid-Hudson Civic Center) and easy to reach by car or bus.

This new location puts Dutchess BOCES adult programs near our current and future students. Sherre Wesley, who was the Adult Education Administrator at that time, stated "Dutchess BOCES ALI is within easy walking distance to those organizations with which we work. For students, that means easy access to services and for staff it means easier and quicker communication and less time traveling to meetings." She continued, "We're now an easy walk to the Department of

Labor, Dutchess One Stop, Department of Social Services - and an elevator ride away from the Dutchess County Regional Chamber of Commerce and Job Corp." ALI combined most of the BOCES programs that were previously housed at the Manufacturing Technology Institute (MTI) off of Route 55 in Poughkeepsie, as well as those programs that were located at the Family Partnership Center (FPC).

Among the ALI courses offerings are GED® preparation, ESL, nursing assistant, phlebotomy, real estate salesperson, and workplace skills training. Continuing education courses range from computer applications to defensive driving to digital photography. Space is available for specialized corporate training and ALI is ready to design programs to meet the needs of area businesses. Registration is ongoing and new courses start year round.

CTI Students Erect New Sign for Webutuck

Dutchess BOCES Career and Technical Education students were asked by Webutuck Superintendent Steven D. Schoomaker to design, build and erect a new sign for the district. The sign replaced the current sign on Route 22 in Webutuck.

Educational Resources – Quest Atlantis Training

In September 2010, the Dutchess BOCES Model Schools Program hosted a meeting of our counter parts from throughout New York State. Almost thirty Model Schools specialists from BOCES and Regional Information Centers across the state attended. Although this was a regularly scheduled quarterly meeting of our Statewide Model Schools group, the two-day session was dedicated to a special event. We were all "trained to be trainers" for an amazing online 3D learning system called Quest Atlantis (www. questatlantis.org). Quest Atlantis (QA) is an international learning and teaching project that uses a 3D multi-user environment to immerse children, ages 9-16, in educational tasks. QA is provided free to us and our component school districts through this project managed at Indiana University and funded by the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation. Our Learning Technology team and support staff did an amazing job in preparing the technology, the room and refreshments. Our statewide network greatly appreciated Dutchess BOCES hosting this event!

BOCES Student Earns Ray of LIGHT Award

Congratulations to Ashlynn Booker, the first BOCES student of the 2010-2011 school year to receive the prestigious Ray of LIGHT award at Union Vale Middle School. The Ray of LIGHT (Loyalty, Integrity, Generosity, Honesty, Teamwork) program recognizes students who



perform extraordinary good deeds or other acts of kindness with the Union Vale community. Faculty members nominate students and winners receive an award certificate and acknowledgment on the school's main lobby bulletin board for the entire year.

Model Schools Online Learning

The Model Schools staff specialists worked diligently to address online learning opportunities for high school students in New York State. ER specialists continue to work to meet the needs of our students while re-positioning our own teachers to be the providers of online content. Our Model School staff specialists spent quality time in late 2010 meeting with Dutchess County school districts to identify teachers and courses that could be converted to online and subsequently offer "seats" to students from other schools.

Cross-systems Workshop

In late September 2010, Dutchess BOCES Special and Alternative Education Program, along with the Dutchess County Department of Mental Hygiene, Taconic Developmental Disabilities Services Office and Mental Health America, sponsored a Cross-Systems Workshop on Navigating Services for 50 Medical Service Coordinators and Mental Health Case Managers. The workshop dealt with a family's perspective on making the most of what is available when individuals have both mental health and developmental disabilities. The family that graciously spoke and shared their experience was truly a Dutchess BOCES family. The mother works as a teaching assistant in our Alternative High School/Adolescent Day Treatment Program and her daughter is a recent graduate of the same program. The audience came away with a deeper appreciation for the struggles that many families face in obtaining appropriate supports for loved ones with special needs. We thank New Horizons Resources, Inc. for allowing us the use of their stateof-the-art training facility.

Dutchess BOCES GED® Pass Rate Surpasses NYS

A GED® Prep Summary Report from the State Education Department favorably compared the Dutchess BOCES first quarter 2010 GED® pass rate of 81% for the period with the overall New York State pass rate of 51% for the same period. When asked, ALI administrator Mary Fayne Simpson reported that this success could be attributed to our higher classroom and testing standards. Simpson also shared plans for the Adult Education Program to partner with additional community agencies to address and provide for a variety of training needs for area literacy students.

The overall pass ratio for the GED® in NY was about 60%. The Dutchess BOCES GED® pass rate was about 70% overall, including walk-ins and those with undocumented levels of preparation. This 70% breaks down into a pass ratio of about 90% for students in the Dutchess BOCES GED® prep program, about 90% for CTI students, and about 85% for AHS students.

When I was at my old school, I used to think I wasn't going to have a bright future. I never wanted to look at any schools especially colleges. I thought

I was going to go to college, last only one day and become a dropout. Now I see my future bright and full of possibilities. Some of the people that have helped me through those times are the wonderful staff here at SPC.

Dutchess BOCES School Library System

Students from the Nursing Assistant Program at the Career and Technical Institute (CTI) completed a sixweek optional training program conducted



by the National Health Promotion Associates (NHPA), a research and development firm. The students participated in interactive workshops designed to promote work-specific skills while reducing the risk for substance abuse. Topics covered included Goal Setting for Success, Effective Communication, Managing Stress, Time and Money, Decision Making and Risk Taking, and Relationship Building. The students participated in a survey in the beginning and the end of the training program.

The LifeSkills Training Transition to Work (LST Transitions) program is an innovative skillsbased substance abuse prevention program that is designed to help




BOCES NOC Moves to SPC Campus

Educational Resources Data and Digital Design

Jeff Rouse reported that Dutchess BOCES updated the "old" Distance Learning COSER to now include eLearning tools for students such as Apex Learning, NovaNet and Compass Odyssey. Each of these Web-based tools offers 24/7/365 access to online courses for such purposes as credit recovery, core, elective, and/or advanced placement courses across all of the major subject areas, such as English language arts, math, science, and social studies. These tools can be used online by students and teachers at home, in school or a blended combination of both.

Outstanding Adult Student Award Winner

The New York Association for Continuing Education (NYACCE) Student of the Year Legislative Awards Event Committee announced Jill Christiansen, Dutchess BOCES Adult Education nominee, as an Outstanding Adult Student Award Recipient for 2011. 
BOCES Pegasus Program Students Recognized


ADT Program Successes

Spotial Career and Technical Students Create Solar-Powered Aquaponic Laboratory

In the spring of 2011, Career and Technical Institute (CTI) students completed a functional solar-powered aquaponics laboratory. The aquaponics project, which involved using a hybrid technology combining aquaculture (growing fish) with hydroponics (growing vegetables without soil), was funded by two grants--one from the Berkshire Taconic Community Foundation's Northeast Dutchess Fund and one from the Community Foundation of Dutchess County.

"We were very grateful to these two agencies for supporting this project," said CTI's principal, Mitchell Shron. "It was a difficult time, economically, for many schools throughout the state, and we were fortunate to have had local community support to be able to create a project that I think really adds value to the educational experience of our students."

Shron said that students in CTI's carpentry, plumbing and heating, welding, electrical construction, and culinary arts programs participated in planning and constructing the lab, and future students can learn about aquaponic farming methods as the lab becomes a permanent fixture at CTI.

Joseph Frolish, CTI's plumbing teacher, explained that aquaponic farms are created by re-circulating water from barrelsized fish tanks into soil-free vegetable beds. The fish waste serves as a natural, organic fertilizer used by the plants, and the plants function as a natural purifying system for the water, which then circulates back into the fish tanks. Both the fish and plants can be harvested for human consumption. According to Frolish, aquaponics systems are safe, healthy, sustainable food-production systems, which are popular in areas that tend to experience drought. "My students really enjoyed working on this project," said Frolish. "They've really gotten into it and they were totally focused on the building process. I think it's great because it gives the students a chance to use the skills and knowledge they gain in the classroom in a practical, creative and fun way."

In addition to the work Frolish's students did in creating the pumping systems, students in carpentry and welding classes created a wood and metal structure to house and support the unit, and culinary arts students worked on planting and harvesting the vegetables grown in the lab, as well as composting food waste that can serve as food for the fish.

Students in Al Berti's electrical construction class installed the solar panels, which power the pumps for the unit. "As far as we've been able to tell, powering a unit like this with a photovoltaic system is pretty unique," said Berti. "We did some research into the few

other projects like this that exist in other schools around the state and most of them were using electricity to run the pumps."

To learn more about aquaponic farming, the culinary and plumbing students visited Cabbage Hill Farm, a large-scale aquaponic farm in Mt. Kisco, as well as SUNY Cobleskill, which offers a college-level course in aquaponic farming.

Principal Shron said that his hope for the future is that the project might serve as an initial step toward establishing a curriculum for a new program focused on agriculture and agribusiness at CTI. "One really neat thing about this project is how many teachers were involved in making it happen," said Shron. "The initial idea actually came from our English instructor, Tracy Gartelmann, who teaches students in our cosmetology program. She read about a home-based aquaponic laboratory in a newspaper article and brought the article to me." Gartelmann requested to take on this project at CTI and Shron agreed. She spoke to her colleagues, got their input and feedback, and wrote up a proposal for the project. Enthusiasm was generated over the course of the year among many teachers and students. Everyone worked hard to make it happen!
