Dutchess BOCES programs continue to benefit from a significant number of grants.

BOCES is already managing an \$8.2 million NYSED grant for the Regional Special Education—Technical Assistance Support Center (RSE-TASC) that runs through 2019. And now, BOCES has been awarded an additional \$2 million to focus similar efforts solely on Dutchess County districts. This funding will be used to provide expert training for special education staff that serve students with disabilities.

Central School District, Poughkeepsie City School District, Rhinebeck Central School District, Spackenkill Union Free School District, and Wappingers Central School District.

BOCES will now be able to expand the effort and offer targeted professional development to help staff from additional districts to become more effective in their positions.

And while prior success has positioned BOCES well to receive new multi-million dollar grants, just as important are the efforts of individual BOCES teachers who take the time to apply for smaller grants that directly benefit students.

During the 2013-14 school year, BOCES staff members independently applied for and were awarded more than 20 grants to support projects for their students. Autism Directory Services, Community Foundations of the Hudson Valley, and Dutchess County United Teachers were among the funding organizations.

BOCES Superintendent John Pennoyer commends staff members for finding unique ways to support educational initiatives in a fiscally challenging time.

> "All educators continue to face tight budgets," said Dr. Pennoyer. "By pursuing and being awarded alternative funding, our staff members are raising

the bar and supplementing the education our students receive with creative experiences that would not otherwise be possible. I applaud them for their efforts."

Dutchess BOCES was again well represented at the 169th Dutchess County Fair, a timeless tradition for families.
