STUDENT CONVOCATION AT FDR SITE

Students from Dutchess BOCES, Orange/Ulster BOCES and Sullivan BOCES, as well as students from Middletown, Onteora, Red Hook High Schools and the Tabernacle Christian Academy recently attended a daylong educational event focusing on life sciences at the Franklin D. Roosevelt Presidential Library and Museum. The keynote address "Epidemics in the 21st Century:

Influenza, Obesity and Other Plagues of the Modern Era" was presented by Dr. Shetal I. Shah. Shah is assistant professor of neonatal medicine at the State University of New York at Stony Brook School of Medicine. Dutchess BOCES District Superintendent Dr. John C. Pennoyer led the educational event, which included presentations from the March of Dimes and a life science researcher.

MEDICAID REIMBURSEMENT ANNUAL REVIEWS

Business Administrator for Human Resources Matt Carr advises that annual reviews are currently underway for Medicaid reimbursements. Under this program, BOCES assists component districts with maximizing their Medicaid reimbursements and compliance with Medicaid reimbursement guidelines. This service maintains comprehensive records to support Medicaid reimbursement claims in the event of an audit, submits required claims for reimbursement and follows up on inquiries received from the Regional Information Center, state and federal offices. The service provides in-service training to district contact personnel on an ongoing basis and works with district personnel in the development of effective internal data collection and record keeping procedures.


KUDOS FROM THE BUSINESS OFFICE

COMMUNITY SOLUTIONS FOR TRANSPORTATION

Dutchess County Executive William Steinhaus, Commissioner of Dutchess County Department of Social Services Robert Allers, and Dutchess BOCES District Superintendent John C. Pennoyer announced that seven pre-determined families received donated vehicles from the Community Solutions for Transportation (CST) and Wheels for Work (WFW) programs at a presentation on April 29 at Lester's Auto Sales and Towing car lot in Poughkeepsie. Transportation services under CST and WFW in Dutchess County are administered by Dutchess BOCES and are funded by the Dutchess County Department of Social Services through an allocation from the New York State Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance, Division of Employment and Transitional Supports.

The seven families selected to receive donated vehicles were chosen based on specific program guidelines, including their work-related need for transportation. Over the past several months, they have been part of a Dutchess BOCES program that prepares them for car ownership. In addition, they have all displayed the perseverance and the commitment

necessary to continually take steps towards financial independence. Having their own vehicle will help them to obtain and retain employment or gain access to higher education to increase their wage potential.

Since 2001, CST and WFW programs across New York State have assisted over 2,500 families with acquiring reliable used cars, repairing, registering, and insuring their own vehicles, and/or obtaining their NYS driver's license. Since inception over 650 families have received donated vehicles through the Dutchess BOCES program. As a direct result of this and other services provided by the Transportation Program, approximately 325 individuals have been able to obtain new employment and about 750 individuals have been able to retain their current employment.

Here are just a few testimonials from the program's recent recipients . . .

Vikki Harris:

Vikki is a substitute teacher. She found it difficult to get to work without a car. Many times she would receive offers to take a substitute position, but she would have to turn down the job because she depended upon public transportation to get to the work location, and often the school was not near a bus route. With a car of her own she can accept many more teaching job offers. She is so happy and thinks the program is wonderful. She found out about the BOCES program through word of mouth.

"During these difficult economic times, I feel fortunate to have been involved in this program in order to help me maintain employment."

Stacy Clarke:

Stacy already had her driver's license. She learned about the BOCES program through her sister. Stacy works in a nursing home and found it difficult to catch a bus or hitch a ride every day to and from work. Now she can just hop into her own car.

"I love it--it's an excellent program for single parent's. It's the best thing that could possibly happen to me. It's a breath of fresh air . . . I feel like a million bucks, and more!"

Louis Bailey:

Louis heard about the program from his caseworker and some friends. He was working as a driver for A&E Transport in Poughkeepsie, but was stuck in the same position with no opportunity for a pay increase. He wanted to obtain a CDL with passenger endorsement, but had no means of driving to Haverstraw, the only place in the vicinity that gives that test.

"I am very ecstatic. Now I can take my endorsement test! The instructors have the best knowledge. This program is great when you have children. It makes life easier. I encourage anyone who is working and needs transportation to apply. It's worth all the courses and effort!"



HOME HEALTH AIDE PROGRAM

Adult education is instituting a Home Health Aide (HHA) program, which will prepare students to work with patients in their homes. It will complement the successful Nursing Assistant program, which prepares students for the CNA examination and to work in facilities such as nursing homes. An HHA advisory group was recently convened. Its members represent all areas of Dutchess County and all aspects of the home health care field. They were enthusiastic in their support for the program, and emphasized the need and employment opportunities in the HHA field. ADULT EDUCATION LITERACY STATS

MTI's Mary Fayne Simpson has been closely monitoring the Adult Education Literacy statistics for GED outcomes. The program is enjoying a 93% percent pass rate for the 2009-10 school year. Classroom practices such as targeting individual instruction in specific skill areas and requiring students to take and pass the GED practice test have been instrumental in helping our adult students attain their high school equivalency diplomas.



BILINGUAL TEACHERS ON BOARD

Two bilingual teachers recently joined the Adult Education literacy staff. `Felipe Benitez is teaching an ABE/GED class to Spanish students incarcerated in the Dutchess County Jail and at the Martin Luther King Center in Beacon. Laura Barroso-Hazim is teaching English as a Second Language (ESL) to a diverse group of non-native English language learners.

AHS STUDENTS RECEIVE HIGH SCORES ON FINANCIAL CHALLENGE

Congratulations! Two of Kathy White's Alternative High School business class students scored in the top 20th percentile of students nationwide on the National Financial Capability Challenge (NFCC) at the U.S. Department of the Treasury and U.S. Department of Education. In addition, seven of her students beat the national average! Over 76,000 students representing every state completed the Challenge with an average score of 70% correct.

The Challenge is an initiative designed to engage educators in the teaching of personal finance, and to increase the financial knowledge and capability of high school youth across the United States so they can take control over their financial futures. All high school teachers (and other educators) are encouraged to sign up, prepare their students, and administer the voluntary online exam. Educators and top-scoring students in each school earn personalized award certificates and states with the highest participation rates are recognized. RADIO ROTARY



Leadership Dutchess is the signature program of The Chamber Foundation, Inc. (the educational foundation of the Greater Southern Dutchess Chamber of Commerce) and for over twenty years has been dedicated to educating and motivating



This program was designed to foster the development of a group of professionals who grow and learn together over a nine-month period through a variety of experiences that include lively discussions, interactive exercises, experiential roles, community service and ongoing feedback. Leadership Dutchess classes were held once per month September - May and all course work contributed to the knowledge and understanding of leadership. The class covered topics such as leadership styles, stress management and dealing with difficult people, valuing diversity, communications, project management, team building, county government and tourism, and roles and responsibilities of serving on a board. As part of the program requirements, the class completed two major projects:

Rebuilding Together - On April 24, classmates worked on minor renovations and clean-up on a house in Beacon owned by a WWII veteran

Red Carpet Rendezvous - Classmates organized a major fund-raiser held at the Grand Hotel on May 6 to benefit The Chamber Foundation with a net profit of \$12,348




SALT POINT CENTER STUDENTS CELEBRATE EARTH DAY
