


MISSION STATEMENT




Misappropriation of Resident Property Voluntary confinement/seclusion





<u>Abuse</u> - means the willful infliction of injury, unreasonable confinement, intimidation or punishment with resulting physical harm, pain or mental anguish.

<u>Physical Abuse</u> - non-accidental use of force that results in bodily injury, pain or impairment, i.e. being slapped, burned, cut, bruised, fractures or improperly physically restrained.




<u>Verbal Abuse</u>- the use of oral, written or gestured language that willfully includes disparaging and derogatory terms to residents or their families, or within their hearing distance, i.e. threats of harm, saying things to frighten a resident, such as telling a resident that he/she will never be able to see his/her family again.


<u>Sexual Abuse</u> - sexual harassment, sexual coercion, or sexual assault.

<u>Mental Abuse</u> - includes humiliation, harassment, and/or threats of punishment or deprivation

<u>Neglect</u> - failure to provide goods and services necessary to avoid physical harm, mental anguish, or mental illness.




<u>Misappropriation of Resident Property</u> - the deliberate misplacement exploitation, or wrongful, temporary or permanent use of a resident's belongings or money without the resident's consent.




Involuntary Seclusion

a. Separation of a resident from other residents or from his/her room or confinement to his/her room (with or without roommates) against the residents will, or the will of the residents legal representative.

b. Emergency or short term monitored separation form other residents if used as a therapeutic intervention to reduce agitation until professional staff can develop a plan of care to meet the resident's needs.



<u>Reasonable Cause</u> - means that upon review of the circumstances, there is sufficient evidence to suggest that physical abuse, mistreatment, or neglect has occurred and will be reviewed.




PREVENTION OF ABUSE

All occurrences must be investigated and reported.

Wingate At Ulster has zero tolerance for abuse, mistreatment, and neglect.

N.Y.S. Dept. of Health Hotline is utilized for reporting and is posted throughout the facility. Students must report any occurrences to their Instructor immediately.

All residents &/or family members receive a copy of the Resident's Bill of Rights upon admission.




Always knock before entering a resident's room and ask if you may enter.

Always wear your name badge and identify yourself.

Always provide privacy during cares

Always provide treatments, testing, vital signs, and examinations in private areas.




• Dignity, Respect and a Comfortable Living Environment

DO NOT RESUSCITATE (DNR) NEW YORK STATE'S PROXY LAW

• Applies only to cardio-pulmonary resuscitation measures, does not cover withholding nutrition or other medical treatment.


• Can be revoked at any time

• There are different documentation and consent forms that the attending physician must complete depending upon whether the resident does or does not have *capacity or surrogate (*capacity is the ability to understand and appreciate the nature and consequences of a DNR order.)

DO NOT RESUSCITATE NEW YORK STATE'S PROXY LAW

• Every resident admitted to the Facility is presumed to have consented to CPR unless a DNR order is written in the resident's chart in a manner consistent with the policies of Wingate

• The resident's physician must review the order with the resident every 30 days.



DO NOT RESUSCITATE (DNR) NEW YORK STATE'S PROXY LAW

• Before writing a DNR order, the physician must provide the resident with information about CPR und DNR The resident must give oral and written consent in the presence of witnesses.

• If a physician disputes a DNR order, they must make their objections known to the resident and transfer care to another attending physician.

NEW YORK STATE'S PROXY

*Allows individuals to appoint someone they trust to decide about treatment if they lose the ability to decide for themse1ves.

*Does not require a lawyer.

*Health care proxy can be any adult (over 18 yrs of age), including family or friend.

*Gives as little or as much authority as the resident decides.


NEW YORK STATE'S PROXY

*Health care urgent begins making decisions when doctors decide the resident is unable to.

*Agent may not decide about artificial nutrition and hydration unless the resident has specifically made their wishes known.

*Agent must follow instructions.

*Form is available at the time of admission and any time thereafter as requested.




NEW YORK STATE'S PROXY

*Resident can cancel the proxy, change the agent, or change the treatment instructions at any time by filling out a new form.


*Remains valid indefinitely unless resident sets an expiration date.

*Resident must date and sign the form. Two witnesses over I8 must also sign.




*To assure any sentinel event occurring within the Facility is identified promptly, and that timely, appropriate actions are taken to safeguard residents and reduce the risk of such an occurrence in the future. (Joint Commission definition).

*A sentinel event is an unexpected occurrence involving death or serious physical or psychological injury, or the risk thereof. Serious injury includes loss of limb or function. The phrase "or risk thereof' includes any process variation for which a recurrence would carry a significant chance of serious adverse outcome.




*Such events are called "sentinel" because they signal the need for immediate investigation and response. Joint Commission accredited organizations are expected to identify and respond appropriately to all sentinel events occurring in the organization or associated with services the organization provides for.

*Appropriate response includes a timely, thorough and credible root cause, analysis, implementation of improvements to reduce risk and monitoring of the effectiveness of those improvements.



The subset of sentinel events subject to review by Joint Commission includes any occurrence that meets the following criteria:

The event had resulted in an unanticipated death or major permanent function, *not related* to the natural course of the resident's illness or underlying condition. Some examples include:



a)Any resident death, paralysis, coma or other permanent loss of function associated with a medication error.

b) A resident commits suicide within n hours of being discharged from an organization that provides around the clock care.

c)An elopement from an around the clock setting resulting in a temporally related death (suicide, accidental death, homicide).


d) An organization operates on the wrong side often resident's body.



e) Resident abduction from the organization where he or she is receives care.

f) Assault. homicide, or other crime resulting in death or permanent major loss of function.

g) A fall that results in death or a major permanent function as a direct result of the injuries sustained.






FIRE SAFETY




FIRE SAFETY





BODY MECHANICS AND SAFE TRANSFERS

Do not bend at the waist


Keep back straight

Stand close to object

Bend at the hips and knees

Use large muscles of legs

Place feet 12 inches apart to create a wide base of support




BODY MECHANICS AND SAFE TRANSFERS

Determine the size of the load before you lift

Lift firmly and smoothly

Get help if necessary

- Hold the load firmly
- Do not twist



BODY MECHANICS AND SAFE TRANSFERS



Use center of gravity to carry load

Keep back straight

Keep weight of load close to body and centered over you hips


BODY MECHANICS: PULLING/PUSHING

Stand close to object Place feet 12 inches apart Bend at the knees & hips Grasp object at center Use leg muscles Keep back straight



SAFE TRANSFERS USING WHEELCHAIRS & STRETCHERS

- *Always lock the brakes on the wheelchair
- *Always leave the side rails up on the stretcher
- *Never leave a resident unattended on a stretcher
- *Back a wheelchair over a raised ridge
- *Always back inside an elevator



SAFE TRANSFERS USING WHEELCHAIRS & STRETCHERS

*Always back a wheelchair down a ramp

*Make sure residents feet are raised when transporting in a wheelchair

*When transporting in a wheelchair always make sure arms and hands are away from the wheels
